II. General Citizen Comment Period

a. Payson Park Comments

Commissioner comments: Will acknowledge all the negative comments. Does not support the application process the C3, time of year and parking concerns.

Counselor Pelletier Advised the next meeting around this topic, and vote, is proposed for June 21, 2024. Next council discussion and vote will be June 23, 2023.

Zack wants to encourage the commission to have a goal around this process

Beth is unclear around what the commission role is around these issues. Wants to define what the commission's role is in this process.

Marie feels the commission should play a part in the process.

Public comments:

Cathy Ramsdale does not support the concert. The city needs a better review process when reviewing such a large process.

Friends of Pasoin Park, Susan Levine does not support the concert.

b. Food Truck Policy Comments

Public Comments: Karen Snyder: Thanked Alex for his presentation. Concerned about the park commissioners talking about equity? It is not equitable for the residents that live on the hill. All other areas only allow 2 food trucks? Many of the food trucks are being subsidized by the taxpayer.

She stated the Eastern Prom has the least amount of CIP funds allocated. Doesn't feel like she and the eastern prom are being treated fairly. Feels the parks commission is more concerned about making money.

Dyllan Gardiner: Food Truck owner, Positive, likes the proposal especially the electricity.

Negative, unlimited spots granted only 7 guaranteed.

Berry Manter wants to commend the Parks Commission with the exceptional job they have done over the past year. Like the Cutter street changes.

Jonathan Peter, commenting on the CIP, would like a sidewalk from the western prom to Von street.

Mary Casal, has lived on the promenade for several years. Do we really want trucks in the parks at all? How about if the city builds a "food truck plaza?" How about Amethyst Park? Feel the food trucks have caused a division in the community.

Jordan Rubin; Mr Tuna, Wants to make it all work however, charging a fee and not guaranteeing a spot is not feasible.

Diane discussed the overall theme being "sharing" of all the spaces. Sharing of licenses, sharing of parks.

Move the food truck to different parks. Supports more picnic tables. The park belongs to a;; the community.

Garrett Chaplin- Does not support the fee for lease proposal.

Crandall- Does support the rental fees.

Beth asked about the role the food truck plays in our community. How will folks entering this area of business afford the licensing and not cause a barrier. Alex stated, licenses can be shared amongst vendors.

Victoria asked about the sharing of licensing and only a set amount of spots. Will vendors need to be specific about who they will be sharing the license with? A definitive number of shared trucks has not been confirmed. Why are we charging a fee if vendors are reporting a loss in income? Alex responded, we could be adding electricity, adding to the picnic area to accommodate the food truck area

Will feels the new Cutter Street location is a big improvement from the prior location. Feels the fees need to be reviewed.

Allison asked if other food trucks in the city require a license? Alex's response was no.

Dear Mayor Snyder and Portland City Councilors,

Friends of Payson Park respectfully requests the Portland City Council vote against approving the application from C2 Acquisitions, LLC, a division of Live Nation, doing business as C3 Presents, for a music festival in Payson Park.

FOPP members opposition follows a tremendous amount of community engagement on the subject of the proposed festival, including the following:

- an initial meeting with Nan Cumming of the Parks Conservancy and Richard Bulman, representing C3
- a Zoom Meeting with FOPP members at which C3 presented
- a meeting following the District 4 meeting to discuss the proposal with C3 reps presenting
- a meeting between FOPP representatives and Ethan Hipple, Parks and Recreation Director
- a conversation with a Friends Group in Atlanta regarding their experience with hosting a festival
- a review of the C3 application presented to the City
- outreach with community members and professionals knowledgeable of the impacts of large events - and finally,

through research on the subject of impact of large events held in public parks nationally and internationally

FOPP's rationale for its statement is below, and is attached in a pdf for your records.

Please, do not hesitate to reach out to us with any questions. We look forward to attending the upcoming City Council workshop, the Mayor's Zoom call and the November 21, 2023 City Council meeting.

And finally, please know FOPP is made up of musicians, music lovers, festival attenders and professionals in the field, but we do not believe this proposal that plans to bring the equivalent of 1/3 of the City's population to a neighborhood park and closes off public access to that park is an appropriate way to demonstrate that love of music.

Thank you for your service and your efforts to support public parks.

Rationale:

The C3 proposal specifically requests the closure of the entire public park to the public for the purposes of a private event, to the exclusion of public use, and this is our primary concern. Also, there will be significant impact and destruction to grass and other park features, which will require additional closures for reseeding and repairs. Please see our detailed concerns below, including potential violations of Chapter 18-44 of the City Code of Ordinances.

Concerns

Usage of the park. Edward Payson Park is a public park used year-round, especially in the summer. The park provides a variety of dedicated recreational sports areas, open spaces, lawns, pollinator grassy areas, a playground with a water feature used intensively during hot spells, an expanding arboretum, a community garden, and an important wetland area in the southwest corner. The park provides parking for people to access the Back Cove trail and it serves as a commuting route connecting Baxter Boulevard and Ocean Avenue, and its two side streets Fernald and West Kidder, to Washington Avenue. People enjoy walking, biking, skateboarding, rollerblading, baseball, softball, basketball, soccer, football, flag football, pickleball, tennis, dodgeball frisbee,

disc golf, yoga, drumming, fencing, dancing, cheerleading, live action role playing, music making, and various races and competitions, as well as picnicking, birding, and the enjoyment of vistas and open spaces.

Closure to the public. Though the park is often permitted for use by private entities, those events have not required the closing of the whole park to the public for exclusive private use. The festival proposed by C3 Presents will require completely closing the Park to the public for some days prior to, during, and following the festival, with partial closures during more shoulder days for set up and clean up, at least 13 days overall around the event itself; this does not include closures for subsequent repairs and renovations that may be needed. This would be during the Park's most intensively used season.

Pertinent considerations relating to **Chapter 18 in the Code of Ordinances for the City, Section 18-44**, enumerating the **requirements for a permit** for such an event as the festival.

o Item (2) cites the need for adequate parking facilities to accommodate the proposed event.

▪ C3 Presents has said it has obtained lists of the various parking garages and lots in Portland; however, those are likely to be full during July and other summer months. While some school parking lots in the Deering, Back Cove, and East Deering neighborhoods may be available, many church lots will not be usable on Saturday and/or Sunday, limiting parking and shuttle opportunities. Unlike many other (more populated) cities in which large music festivals occur, Portland does not have an extensive public transit system. It is expected that attendees will make use of any side street parking they can find for up to two miles to the east, north and west of the park. Baxter Boulevard is unlikely to re-open to traffic before December 2023, further restricting access and egress. Management of traffic as attendees arrive and especially as they depart will become paramount. While C3's application acknowledges that parking and traffic management will be a challenge, their request for the use of City police and traffic personnel is likely unrealistic given that those departments are significantly understaffed.

o Item (4) states that the event shall not cause damage from destruction or overuse to or overuse of the grounds, equipment, vegetation, buildings, fences or other amenities in the park.

▪ Festivals in other cities evidence extensive damage to grass/turf/sod areas as well as hard surfaces. Having 10,000 to 12,000 attendees per day in Year 1, headed for 20,000 attendees per day in subsequent years means extensive damage to grass areas, requiring 6-8 weeks of no access so that reseeded areas can recover. Potential

damage to ball fields and court surfaces will also require closure until repairs and resurfacing can occur. Of late, specific areas have been left un-mowed to provide habitat for pollinators, and these areas will be trampled at an ecologically critical time. There is concern about damage by attendees during the festival to fences around the ball fields and tennis courts, as well as to trees throughout the park. Trash in the neighborhoods adjacent to and around the park will be an issue and should not be left to the neighbors or the City to clean up.

- The application from C3 Presents acknowledges the likelihood of negative impacts that exceed the timeframe of the event set up and tear down, "Organizers commit to paying for any needed remediation or repair to Edward Payson Park following the event."

- While Item (4) is clear that damage should be avoided in the first place, these circumstances indicate parts of the park will continue to be closed to public access while remediation and repairs take place.

o Item (5) says that the proposed event would not unreasonably disturb persons who occupy land which is adjacent to the park.

- C3 Presents has stated that access to the park through the neighborhoods will become more and more limited during the week leading up to the event and during the event itself, requiring a permit for those living in the neighborhood. Payson Park has residences abutting it on three sides, and Catafalque Drive through the middle of the park is accessed frequently not only by commuters, but also by emergency services responding to calls at Seaside Healthcare. - In Year 1, at least, festival operators will require generators to supply power; it is unclear when generators will be placed into operation; it is likely they will be needed through the night to help maintain security lights and systems. - Residents near Payson Park can hear events held at the Maine State Pier and were able to hear concerts at Rock Row in Westbrook, which means residents around Portland as well as Westbrook will likely hear this event.

• Unknown impacts.

Friends of Payson Park respectfully requests that the Portland City Council vote against approving the application from C2 Acquisitions, LLC, a division of Live Nation, doing business as C3 Presents, for a music festival in Payson Park.

This proposal specifically requests the closure of the entire public park to the public for the purposes of a private event, to the exclusion of public use, and this is our primary concern. Also, there will be significant impact and destruction to grass and other park features, which will require additional closures for reseeding and repairs. Please see our detailed concerns below, including potential violations of Chapter 18-44 of the City Code of Ordinances.

The mission of Friends of Payson Park

Edward Payson Park is a unique resource for the City of Portland, Maine, offering year-round opportunities for sports, recreation, relaxation and contemplation. Our mission is to act as stewards to protect, preserve and enhance the park while assuring it blends harmoniously with its adjoining communities. Our goal is to work in collaboration with the City of Portland to develop sound management policies for park programming and development that benefit area neighborhoods and the wider Portland community, while balancing concerns for the unique ecological and geographic features of the park.

Dear Councilor Zarro and other Portland City Council Members:

I am a resident of the East Deering neighborhood in Portland and am writing to strongly urge you to reject the permit application by C3 Presents for a concert festival in Payson Park. I am against the proposal for several reasons. The primary reason is that this concert has the potential to be an extremely large event, that I fear would overwhelm our neighborhood with people (both residents and nonresidents of Portland), cars (parking is already hard to find in the city), noise (we currently have three major construction jobs underway in the East Deering/Baxter Boulevard area), and at least temporarily, litter. In short, this is an environmental issue that could negatively impact the park and nearby Back Cove.

A second reason for my opposition is a matter of good public policy. Should we really be "selling" our public parks to major private entertainment companies for any reason? If it is a matter of raising funds to maintain our city parks, I would rather consider less risky methods such as gradual tax increases (I don't mind paying my fair share), user fees, donation opportunities for park users, or better budget management of existing city revenue streams.

Third, Payson Park is beloved by residents because of its natural beauty and the current recreational opportunities it offers, activities that include tennis, basketball, baseball, softball, family winter sledding, and walking. These are all minimal impact activities that don't threaten the park or the surrounding neighborhood. The park is already busy with these uses when the weather permits. Anyone who claims otherwise simply doesn't visit the park enough. As a resident of East Deering, I see the activity all the time.

Payson Park is a beloved public common area that needs to be utilized with wisdom and respect. Please reject this proposal.

Hello,

I am a Falmouth resident living within walking distance of Payson Park.

I do not support the idea of a large music festival in Payson Park during the month of July as proposed by C3 Presents for the following reasons:

1. Summer is already an extremely busy time in the Portland area. Roads, parking areas, restaurants and hotels are already near maximum capacity. A shoulder-season festival would still be well-received by prospective attendees and would be less likely to overwhelm infrastructure.

2. Crowds of that magnitude will inevitably cause damage to the park. Cleanup, turf repair, etc., will eat into any proceeds derived by the city. A smaller festival AND higher payment to the city is warranted if the idea of a festival is to be pursued.

3. I'm having trouble reconciling the Council's decisions regarding food trucks on the Eastern Prom with their willingness to entertain proposals for a for-profit music festival in another park. Supposedly, the food trucks bring intolerable levels of trash, congestion, and damage to trees. Won't a festival with 20,000 people invite the same result? Why is this acceptable in Payson Park, but not on the Eastern Prom? Why is this acceptable for a massive, out-of-state corporation but not for small, local businesses?

Friends of Payson Park Position on Proposed Music Festival November 10, 2022

Friends of Payson Park respectfully requests that the Portland City Council vote against approving the application from C2 Acquisitions, LLC, a division of Live Nation, doing business as C3 Presents, for a music festival in Payson Park.

This proposal specifically requests the closure of the entire public park to the public for the purposes of a private event, to the exclusion of public use, and this is our primary concern. Also, there will be significant impact and destruction to grass and other park features, which will require additional closures for reseeding and repairs. Please see our detailed concerns below, including potential violations of Chapter 18-44 of the City Code of Ordinances.

The mission of Friends of Payson Park

Edward Payson Park is a unique resource for the City of Portland, Maine, offering year-round opportunities for sports, recreation, relaxation and contemplation. Our mission is to act as stewards to protect, preserve and enhance the park while assuring it blends harmoniously with its adjoining communities. Our goal is to work in collaboration with the City of Portland to develop sound management policies for park programming and development that benefit area neighborhoods and the wider Portland community, while balancing concerns for the unique ecological and geographic features of the park.

Concerns

- **Usage of the park.** Edward Payson Park is a public park used year-round, especially in the summer. The park provides a variety of dedicated recreational sports areas, open spaces, lawns, pollinator grassy areas, a playground with a water feature used intensively during hot spells, an expanding arboretum, a community garden, and an important wetland area in the southwest corner. The park provides parking for people to access the Back Cove trail and it serves as a commuting route connecting Baxter Boulevard and Ocean Avenue along with side streets to Washington Avenue. People enjoy walking, biking, skateboarding, rollerblading, baseball, softball, basketball, soccer, football, flag football, pickleball, tennis, dodgeball, frisbee, disc golf, yoga, drumming, fencing, dancing, cheerleading, live action role playing, music making, and various races and competitions, as well as picnicking, birding, and the enjoyment of vistas and open spaces.
- **Closure to the public.** Though the park is often permitted for use by private entities, those events have not required the closing of the whole park to the public for exclusive private use. The festival proposed by C3 Presents will require completely closing the Park to the public for some days prior to, during, and following the festival, with partial closures during more shoulder days for set up and clean up, at least 13 days overall around the event itself; this does not include closures for subsequent repairs and renovations that may be needed. This would be during the Park's most intensively used season.
- Pertinent considerations relating to **Chapter 18 in the Code of Ordinances for the City, Section 18-44**, enumerating the **requirements for a permit** for such an event as the festival.
 - **Item (2) cites the need for adequate parking facilities to accommodate the proposed event.** ▪ C3 Presents has said it has obtained lists of the various parking garages and lots in Portland; however, those are likely to be full during July and other summer months. While some school parking lots in the Deering, Back Cove, and East Deering neighborhoods may be available, many church lots will not be usable on Saturday and/or Sunday, limiting parking and shuttle opportunities. Unlike many other (more populated) cities in which large music festivals occur, Portland does not have an extensive public transit system. It is expected that attendees will make use of any on street parking they can find for up to two miles to the east, north and west of the park. Baxter Boulevard is unlikely to re-open to traffic before December 2023, further restricting access and egress. Management of traffic as attendees arrive and especially as they depart will become paramount. While C3's application acknowledges that parking and traffic management will be a challenge, their request for the use of City police and traffic personnel is likely unrealistic given that those departments are significantly understaffed.

- **Item (4) states that the event shall not cause damage from destruction or overuse to or overuse of the grounds, equipment, vegetation, buildings, fences or other amenities in the park.** ▪ Festivals in other cities evidence extensive damage to grass/turf/sod areas as well as hard surfaces. Having 10,000 to 12,000 attendees per day in Year 1, headed for 20,000 attendees per day in subsequent years means extensive damage to grass areas, requiring 6-8 weeks of no access so that reseeded areas can recover. Potential damage to ball fields and court surfaces will also require closure until repairs and resurfacing can occur. Of late, specific areas have been left un-mowed to provide habitat for pollinators, and these areas will be trampled at an ecologically critical time. There is concern about damage by attendees during the festival to fences around the ball fields and tennis courts, as well as to trees throughout the park. Trash in the neighborhoods adjacent to and around the park will be an issue and should not be left to the neighbors or the City to clean up.
 - The application from C3 Presents acknowledges the likelihood of negative impacts that exceed the timeframe of the event set up and tear down, “Organizers commit to paying for any needed remediation or repair to Edward Payson Park following the event.”
 - While Item (4) is clear that damage should be avoided in the first place, these circumstances indicate parts of the park will continue to be closed to public access while remediation and repairs take place.
- **Item (5) says that the proposed event would not unreasonably disturb persons who occupy land which is adjacent to the park.**
 - C3 Presents has stated that access to the park through the neighborhoods will become more and more limited during the week leading up to the event and during the event itself, requiring a permit for those living in the neighborhood. Payson Park has residences abutting it on three sides, and Catafalque Drive through the middle of the park is accessed frequently not only by commuters, but also by emergency services responding to calls at Seaside Healthcare. Access to and through the neighborhoods surrounding the park will continue to be a challenge with the continued closure through most of 2023 of Baxter Boulevard from Payson Park to Vannah Street.
 - In Year 1, at least, festival operators will require generators to supply power; it is unclear when generators will be placed into operation; it is likely they will be needed through the night to help maintain security lights and systems. It is unclear how both the sounds of generators and lights at night will impact residents in the neighborhoods.
 - Residents near Payson Park can hear events held at the Maine State Pier and were able to hear concerts at Rock Row in Westbrook, which means residents around Portland as well as Westbrook will likely hear this event.
- **Item (6) states that the park or portion thereof has not been reserved for other use that day.** ▪ Payson Park is used intensely in the summer months by a wide variety of groups and individuals, every single day (see **Usage** section above). Many people from near and far travel to the park on a regular and recurring weekly basis to participate in organized sports and practices. Blocking access to the park, including closure of the surrounding roads as outlined in the application, closes off for many their only option for recreation, and removes access for travel through the park to get to work, whether people drive, walk or bike. **Limiting and then eliminating access, spanning a 13-day period, with additional sectional closures for damage remediations and vegetative recovery makes Payson Park an inappropriate location for such an event.**
- **Unknown impacts.**
 - Stormwater separation systems operate in the south end of the park, under Baxter Boulevard and under the grass area south of the Little League field (east of the playground and west of Seaside Healthcare). An assessment of the potential impact of this proposed festival needs to be made to identify risks and possible damage to this infrastructure or access to this infrastructure.
 - It is unclear how and whether this event is in alignment with the City’s One Climate Future goals, which the city is in the process of codifying. Our parks play important roles both in carbon sequestration and in the enhancement of human mental and physical health. To deny the public access is in conflict with the purpose of our public parks.

Hello,

My name is Devin Green. I am a 10-year resident and die-hard lover of Portland, and I live on Payson Park (District 4). I also have a professional background in events, concerts, festivals and sponsorship activations at such events, and I am a huge music lover, including festivals. Despite that, I am writing to ask you to **NOT approve** the application C3 Presents has submitted to host an annual festival in Payson Park beginning in July of 2023. I have sent a similar email to the councilors but wanted to reach out to all of you as well, to share what I have learned and my eventual thoughts on this application.

I have had many conversations and conducted my own research about this* (specifics at bottom) and my **final upshot** is that I believe Portland would benefit from a wonderful music festival, but I do not think THIS specific iteration, timing

or plan is the correct solution. I think the City of Portland could put out an RFP (request for proposal) and get proposals from different festival organizers and ideally even local organizers that would allow the City to intentionally determine the best way to go about this. Below are a few of the key reasons I have come to this conclusion that I ask you to consider as you review C3 Presents' application:

This is rushed. C3 Presents needs this to be reviewed and approved by the November 21st meeting in order to secure the acts for the festival. That is no doubt true. But that doesn't mean that the City needs to rush the process of considering how best to host a festival. This can wait until 2024 and be done well, instead of rushing into something without enough information. Especially given they are asking for a 10-year contract.

This application is sparse. In order for the City to approve something this significant, I believe you should have MUCH more information. In Atlanta (and no doubt other large cities), an application requires maps, plans, closures, schedules, a lot more than what is provided in the application that C3 Presents has submitted. The Portland application asks for maps and plans, but it does not technically require them, and C3 Presents has not provided them. They continuously say they will work with the city, but that amount of uncertainty does not feel sufficient to be able to consider or approve this caliber of event. This is the same application someone submits for a small gathering in a park. I believe that a better process needs to be developed to consider ideas with this scale of impact.

July is not the best timing. July is our busiest month for tourism. All of the hotels and short-term rentals are full, restaurants are booked up and busting at the seams and shops are thriving. This is not the time to bring in 20,000 more people. Wouldn't it be better to do this in say October when businesses would benefit and recreation would be less impacted?

Payson Park is not the best venue. I want to be very clear that this is not a "Not in my Backyard" NIMBY situation. I would frankly love to have incredible music playing in my backyard. But there are serious concerns with using Payson Park specifically.

Payson is a major recreation park for the city. People use it on for tennis, basketball, work out classes, running, cycling, tai chi, dance classes, yoga, frisbee, dog walking, etc. But even more people are using it daily, especially in the Summer and Fall for recreation and sports leagues – football, soccer, flag football, dodgeball, softball, baseball, little league. Cheverus even uses it for practices.

C3 Presents states the park will be closed down for the festival itself (possibly fully shut down for 5 days) and parts of it will be closed for up to 10-13 days including setup/breakdown. But the impact will likely be MUCH longer. If the grass is damaged in any capacity, which it almost certainly will, it will need to be replanted and then tended to while it grows back, which could essentially close down the park for up to 6-8 weeks!

Additionally, if the courts (basketball and tennis) are damaged, which they can easily be if used for porta-potties or VIP areas (which they often are because they are prime flat surfaces – in Atlanta and likely other cities, C3

removes the nets and the chain link around the courts to be able to use them), they would need to be resurfaced also, which again, takes time and money. All of this is being proposed as work the city would do and would be compensated for. But, it takes time and I wonder if the Parks department is even staffed up enough to literally redo the whole park as quickly as possible while tending to other park needs around the City as well. There are also environmental impacts on Payson Park outside of the rec impact. There are pollinator gardens, fragile trees in the arboretum, a water treatment area). And there are already drainage concerns in the park. It has a road running through it which currently has about 2000 cars moving through it a day. Closing down or restricting access for up to 10-13 days is going to have a major impact on traffic, especially while Baxter Blvd. is still closed (which it is supposed to be through the proposed timeline). Why not use a park without specific commuter traffic through it, that is more self-contained, as is true of most of the parks festivals like this happen in (including C3 Presents' festivals)

There is no parking and no public transportation to the area. Why not use a park or area with excellent parking (farther outside the city) or one that is on the peninsula so people can walk and bike more easily and they are closer to businesses that could benefit from patrons?

All of the above leads me to wonder IF a public park needs to be the venue (see next point), isn't Deering Oaks Park a far better option for a festival like this. Yes, similar residential impact, but a much better solution (would not impact recreation if closed off in the right circumference and didn't cut off access to the courts and playground, does not impact traffic as no traffic running through area that could be used, much better parking/transportation/access for people to get to easily), is an under-utilized park (as are most of the parks where festivals like this are held, including C3 Presents festivals at least in Austin and Atlanta) and has also hosted stages and large events before (Pride, etc.). That is one of many options but I believe would make much more sense if a public park needed to be the venue.

Public parks are meant for public access – is it a concern to rent it to a for-profit entity:

What will the impact be long-term – is this pandora's box of large for-profit events?

I have heard that it is illegal to close a public park for a private event, according to the city's definition of a public park? Having free festivals and events open to the public is great, but a paid event that closes an ENTIRE public park seems not aligned with the purpose of a public park.

Why not host it somewhere like Rock Row or Thompson's Point that are already set up for this type of situation and will not have as much unnecessary impact on other city experiences.

Who does it benefit and how? The City and its residents definitely have the opportunity to benefit from a festival like this. But I feel that who it benefits and how should be more thought-out and transparent before a decision is made. The current application states the city will receive \$1 of what we have heard is likely at least a \$175 ticket (and possibly much more). C3 has chosen the Parks Conservancy as the non-profit to partner with. I have heard that the conservancy "can expect to receive a 6-figure donation." City services will be paid for the work they do (parks & rec, fire, EMS, etc. – again, if there are even enough staff to take on the work, and it would require A LOT of city staff). This is all rather vague. I feel it is necessary for decision-makers to have much more information on who will benefit and how. And personally, I would love for an organizer to come into the City (or already be local ideally) and truly work with us as a partner to build a festival that would benefit the City and its residents, and do that work to build buy-in, trust and mutual benefit BEFORE it is approved. A partnership built on transparent and mutual benefit from the beginning, including where money is going, what local vendors and partners will be pulled in, who has provided insight into the plans, etc. And I wonder where a "donation" or beneficiary could be considered. I think the parks need support, but do they need as much support as other key issues in our city, such as homelessness?

In Conclusion: Again, I want to reiterate that I think a festival in Portland is a great idea. So, we have an opportunity but I do not think that what C3 Presents is currently proposing is the right solution. There is just not enough information and there are too many questions right now. I ask that you NOT APPROVE this application and that you instead consider how the right solution can be found.

I am more than happy to connect with you if you would like to discuss any of the above. Thank you for your time and consideration.

Hello Councilors and City Staff,

Thank you for all your consideration of C3s Payson Park Permit Application. As you know, I feel very strongly that there is not adequate information included in the permit to even consider this application and urge you to **please VOTE NO**. I want to share two additional pieces of insight/information for you.

First, in case you did not see it, I wrote a Maine Voices piece for the Portland Public Herald. This consolidates my feelings around the serious lack of information included in the permit application, which is *not even a fraction* of what C3 Presents has provided in other permit applications in other cities, even new cities they're working with that are very similar to ours (see Susan' Lavigne's email regarding Georgetown Texas). Second, I want to address what I've learned in my research regarding **City Park usage precedents**:

The *Deering Oaks Family Festival* was eventually cancelled by the city because of how much damage it did to the park. And as a result, the Deering Oaks Master Plan was significantly modified to include restrictions to if, how and how much the park is allowed to be used. I have attached the appendix that specifically addresses that here. This could be a great consideration starting point for the policy and decisions you make moving forward. The *Mumford & Sons show* 10 years ago was held on the Eastern Prom. There are some really significant differences between that process/event and this one...

The Friends of the Eastern Prom was very much FOR the event, not against it. The State Theatre also worked directly with the Friends group and it benefited them directly to take care of the park as they saw fit - there was no middle man

It did not shut down the whole park - there was still public use available.

The entire process was fleshed out with the public and in the public eye. The State Theatre partnered with the city transparently and collaboratively to figure this all out.

It would have been cancelled if it had rained. They were not allowed to host the concert if it rained. The Payson Park C3 festival is rain or shine.

There's clearly a reason this hasn't happened since.

Additionally, there have clearly been concerns with the use of *Congress Square Park* for for-profit use, and then most recently issues with the *Food Trucks on the Prom*. These are much smaller impact than a 40,000 person event over two days.

Clearly, there is an opportunity for you to consider and develop really good policy and procedures for if, how, and how much parks should be used for profit and what the income could be used for.

I will see you all tomorrow night and again, I appreciate your time and consideration of this matter. I know this has not been easy and I appreciate the work you put in on this and all things.

I have lived in Portland for 10 years and am a lover of this city. I am also a live music lover, and have a professional background in events, concerts and sponsorships at large festivals. With that context, for many reasons, I love the idea of Portland having a music festival, but I feel strongly that on Monday, Nov. 21, the Portland City Council should not approve concert promoter C3 Presents' application to host a two-day festival in Payson Park, drawing 20,000 people per day, starting July 2023. I feel it would be irresponsible and possibly even negligent for the City Council to approve this. Here's why.

This is part of a bigger issue – whether and how public parks can be used by private entities. It's come up with Deering Oaks, Congress Square Park, the Eastern Prom and now Payson Park. The city needs to intentionally consider and decide if, how or how much our parks can be used by for-profit interests.

Because there is little precedent for an event of this scale in Portland, the permit application used by C3 used has minor requirements compared to the applications it must submit to other cities. While Portland's application requests detailed maps and plans, C3 opted not to include any. To me, that's a red flag. [The application](#) lacks essential information such as how the park will be used, ticket prices, staffing plans, emergency plans, parking and transportation plans. C3 claims it will be “sorted out” once the permit is approved. That is dangerously inadequate.

Here are some of my many concerns and questions:

- July is the worst timing. Hotels, Airbnbs, restaurants, shops, parks, parking lots and streets are already bursting at the seams with tourists. This is not when the city needs

Related: Yarmouth Clam Festival takes place that weekend.

- Payson Park will be shut down for up to 13 days – and likely much longer (as any festival-goer knows, grass will be damaged and will need to be replaced/repaid; according to a local expert, this could take a few months). Such a closure would curtail much of Payson’s grass-based sports and recreation. Courts could require resurfacing as well (more closure time). Pollinator gardens, the arboretum and wildlife habitat will also be affected. Does Parks & Rec have adequate staffing for quick post-festival restoration?

Does the city have adequate staffing for the necessary police, EMS and other emergency services?

- There is no parking or public transportation. C3 suggests people park downtown (where?) and walk or bike, and that they may engage Greater Portland METRO buses/shuttles. But 20,000 people per day? And road closures through Payson Park and Baxter Boulevard?
- Who benefits? C3 provides \$1/ticket to the city and [a \\$100,000 donation to Portland Parks Conservancy](#). Does this outweigh the cultural, environmental and recreational cost?

C3 opted to provide minimal information, leaving too many questions unanswered. Trust must be earned. C3 is asking Portlanders for blind faith, and way too much of it. The City Council does not need to rush this process and I urge them not to.

Moving forward, the council must determine whether, how and how much city parks can be used for profit. Then put out a requests for organizers (local and not) to submit proposals, intentionally finding the best partner and most beneficial solution,

Hello Councilors and Staff,

I want to express a very heartfelt **Thank You** for listening to the concerns of the public and Friends of Payson Park regarding C3s Festival application and the policies and process that surround it. I was heartened by your decision and although surprised they were now open to delaying the process, it is a much better path forward.

In the statement I prepared for Monday night, I included my hopes for next steps. I am breaking down my thoughts as I believe it remains a great solution:

Step 1: The city first needs to determine *if, how and how much* City Parks can be used for profit, and that procedures, fees and applications are developed to reflect that. I think this is essential **and must precede the next step**. Some ideas I have learned about:

I shared with you previously the Deering Oaks Master plan (attached again) that has a breakdown of what is allowed in their park and how long closures will occur for restoration, etc. That's an interesting reference point.

I have heard about other cities that allow a certain number of events at certain sizes, which could have a reflective fee structure.

If the city decides for-profit is allowed, I really recommend how the city benefits (a portion of proceeds, a fee structure, etc.) and that there be clear direction about where that money will go (does it go directly to CIP funds for that park specifically or the Friends of the Park, or towards an essential issue in the city?).

Step 2: Then, if a festival is allowed according to those decisions, I ask that C3s proposal be one of many that the city considers. Put out an RFP* or somehow encourage organizers, both local and not, to submit proposals taking into account the most beneficial size, timing, location and benefactor. This will allow the city to find the best festival design and festival partner:

A good partner will learn about (or already know) the major needs and issues of our city and collaborate to create a truly mutually-beneficial plan.

A good partner will put in time and effort to build relationships and trust with the city and the public. A good partner will be transparent - providing ALL the information needed for the council and public to make a truly informed decision.

* Perhaps Creative Portland could run point if this is related to their role in the city?

If I can be of assistance in this process, please let me know. And thank you again for this thoughtful decision and path forward.

I also want to share with you that despite the surprise of this process getting pushed, I am so glad I was at the meeting Monday night. The comments that some of you shared at the beginning of the meeting were vulnerable, poignant, moving and examples of great leadership, the type of leadership I hope we are moving towards as a society. Thank you for sharings yourselves and your words. Thank You!

I hope you all have a wonderful week and please know that within the complicated nature of this holiday, I am grateful and your decision is part of that.

Dear Esteemed Members of the City Council of Portland, Maine,

I have never once written to the City Council. My name is Dr. Jeffrey Barkin, I have lived at [105 Parsons Road](#) in Portland for 18 years. I am a physician who has a practice in the Old Port and I have to commute to my office on Exchange Street and back from my home. It has been wonderfully exciting to see much of the development in Portland. This has made for a thriving "scene" as evidenced by an active and world-renowned foodie/music/art/business community. The many projects, including construction of large buildings in downtown Portland, is similarly exciting.

That said, living in certain parts of Portland has become increasingly difficult. As a resident of Back Cove, I can tell you that getting around the city represents an increasing challenge. My drive commute time to my office only 1.7 miles away now approaches 30 minutes at times. Baxter Blvd is closed; Ocean Avenue - a one lane road in each direction - has construction right in Falmouth and the traffic on Rt 9 is therefore excessive. Forest Avenue remains a nightmare. Commute times have increased and some of my neighbors are increasingly reluctant to even drive during times where traffic is heavy as it is perceived as dangerous. Said simply, we do not have sufficient roads and infrastructure to support our current needs as a resident of Portland, Maine.

The concept of a large music festival in Payson Park sounds great, offers to generate revenue, and enhance the presence of Portland. While these are all good goals, we simply do not have the infrastructure to allow the permit application from C3 for such a large music festival. Not based on NIMBYism but based on safety and access, we simply do not have the ability to have so much traffic.

As you are elected to carry out the will of the people of Portland, I strongly urge you to reject the permit application from C3.

My name is Steve Linnell, I live at [17 Alton Street](#) in Portland and I am writing to ask you to reject the permit application from C3 Presents for a music festival in Payson Park.

This proposal specifically requests the closure of the entire public park to the public for the purposes of a private event, to the exclusion of public use. There is also the possibility of significant destruction to grass and other park features, which will require additional closures for reseeding and repairs further limiting the public use of this park during one of the most heavily used times of year in a park that experiences a wonderful variety of uses. I believe that public parks should be available for **all** of the public to enjoy, not just those who can afford an expensive ticket to an exclusive event.

It seems to me, from what I heard at the zoom meeting last week, that the applicants are pushing for a very quick decision without providing adequate information about their plans. It also seems that what they are offering the City is almost laughable. I am particularly concerned about the parking and transportation issues. As a resident I often walk or take the bus into town because parking can be quite sparse. The idea that people will park on the peninsula and take a bus to Payson Park is ridiculous. They're going to clog all the streets in the vicinity, parking in places that are not appropriate, and "pre-gaming" in our neighborhoods.

There are far more appropriate venues for music festivals in the Greater Portland area. Please vote no on this application.

Dear Mayor Snyder, Members of the Portland City Council, Director Hipple, Director Downs, Director Marshall, and Members of the Portland Maine Parks Commission,

My husband, Charlie Collins, and I are music lovers. My husband plays as a drummer in two local bands. And yet we are in vehement opposition to the for-profit, two-day, 20,000 people concert event proposed for Payson Park for the summer of 2023. We would be very open to a one-day, much smaller non-profit event - but the proposed event is wrong for this residential park area.

Our biggest concern is that public parks should never be exploited for for-profit organizations. They do, after all, have the word "public" in their name. They are provided to residents of the city, who fund them with their hard-earned tax dollars. Taking a highly used public park away from its users for the proposed 10-day period would be like taking Portland taxpayer dollars and donating them to this for-profit concert organizer. We will not be reimbursed for 10 days of no park access - where people take leisure with their children, their friends, their pets, and refresh their mental health in order to be good Portland citizens...

Our second concern is location. We wouldn't wish this kind of event on anyone's residential area, and certainly don't welcome it in ours. Events like the one proposed are meant for large spaces that can accommodate large groups, large parking areas, toilets/food/water, proper security, and are in places where noise pollution and traffic disruptions will not directly affect neighbors, children and pets for 10 days, including 20+ hours in one weekend. The Cumberland Fairgrounds, or other available private farm land - which would not be spoiled by 40,000 trampling feet - come to mind as alternatives. May I ask where the organizers of this event live?... And could they envision setting up this event next to their own homes for a full 10-days?... Additionally, if Baxter Blvd. - as a major artery in/out of Payson Park - will still not be available at the time proposed for this event, this will put tremendous stress on area traffic.

May we add: July 4th, 2022 was a scary mess in Payson Park - and to our knowledge this has never been discussed publicly. It was the only negative July 4 experience we've had in 16 years living on the border of the Park. There were the largest number and largest size of illegal personal fireworks fired off that we've ever experienced. It didn't feel like a family-friendly event at all. There were no visible police patrols around the Park - no one stemming the illegal behavior.

Families with small children and darkness and huge personal fireworks going off all added up to something that did not feel safe, and could've gotten out-of-hand very quickly. It's a well-documented fact that people are struggling right now with their mental health post-Covid and in our current political climate. We don't feel like this large and prolonged event is appropriate for a residential neighborhood for these reasons as well. It's also well-documented that the city of Portland does not have enough police officers on its staff at this time. We don't question their willingness and expertise, but we have to question the staff's ability to provide appropriate security and safety for an event of this size and length - regardless of any security that the organizer promises to provide.

And finally, we completely resent the time away from our work and other responsibilities it takes to organize against such a huge event, which is an invasion of a peaceful park and neighborhood like ours. This proposal is really not fair to neighbors who live near the Park, nor to those who will be affected by the noise pollution that will be carried across the water by the Back Cove, or to those affected by the traffic disruptions that would extend the traffic disruptions that we've experienced in this area for years since the city's sewer separation projects have been under way.

Many thanks for your review of our concerns and for strongly considering them as you weigh your recommendation to the City Council for their 11/21 meeting. Our neighbors who have given their permission are copied here, and we hope will share their additional thoughts and concerns.

My family utilizes Payson Park all summer for bike rides, the playground, the splash pad, the arboretum, and to access Back Cove Trail. Dozens and dozens of neighbors walk past our house each day on their way to the park. It is our #1 favorite thing about the location of our home.

Many successful events have been welcomed, planned and executed there including overflow parking on West Kidder St. In over 9 years, only one or two have had a negative impact on us, related to amplified music and PA systems. However, the vast majority of these happen in late summer/early fall, not mid-summer. Most are charitable benefits and local sports

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## **Friends of Payson Park Position on Proposed Music Festival November 10, 2022**

**Friends of Payson Park respectfully requests that the Portland City Council vote against approving the application from C2 Acquisitions, LLC, a division of Live Nation, doing business as C3 Presents, for a music festival in Payson Park.**

This proposal specifically requests the closure of the entire public park to the public for the purposes of a private event, to the exclusion of public use, and this is our primary concern. Also, there will be significant impact and destruction to grass and other park features, which will require additional closures for reseeding and repairs. Please see our detailed concerns below, including potential violations of Chapter 18-44 of the City Code of Ordinances.

### **The mission of Friends of Payson Park**

Edward Payson Park is a unique resource for the City of Portland, Maine, offering year-round opportunities for sports, recreation, relaxation and contemplation. Our mission is to act as stewards to protect, preserve and enhance the park while assuring it blends harmoniously with its adjoining communities. Our goal is to work in collaboration with the City of Portland to develop sound management policies for park programming and development that benefit area neighborhoods and the wider Portland community, while balancing concerns for the unique ecological and geographic features of the park.

## Concerns

- **Usage of the park.** Edward Payson Park is a public park used year-round, especially in the summer. The park provides a variety of dedicated recreational sports areas, open spaces, lawns, pollinator grassy areas, a playground with a water feature used intensively during hot spells, an expanding arboretum, a community garden, and an important wetland area in the southwest corner. The park provides parking for people to access the Back Cove trail and it serves as a commuting route connecting Baxter Boulevard and Ocean Avenue along with side streets to Washington Avenue. People enjoy walking, biking, skateboarding, rollerblading, baseball, softball, basketball, soccer, football, flag football, pickleball, tennis, dodgeball, frisbee, disc golf, yoga, drumming, fencing, dancing, cheerleading, live action role playing, music making, and various races and competitions, as well as picnicking, birding, and the enjoyment of vistas and open spaces.
- **Closure to the public.** Though the park is often permitted for use by private entities, those events have not required the closing of the whole park to the public for exclusive private use. The festival proposed by C3 Presents will require completely closing the Park to the public for some days prior to, during, and following the festival, with partial closures during more shoulder days for set up and clean up, at least 13 days overall around the event itself; this does not include closures for subsequent repairs and renovations that may be needed. This would be during the Park's most intensively used season.
- Pertinent considerations relating to **Chapter 18 in the Code of Ordinances for the City, Section 18-44**, enumerating the **requirements for a permit** for such an event as the festival.
  - **Item (2) cites the need for adequate parking facilities to accommodate the proposed event.** ▪ C3 Presents has said it has obtained lists of the various parking garages and lots in Portland; however, those are likely to be full during July and other summer months. While some school parking lots in the Deering, Back Cove, and East Deering neighborhoods may be available, many church lots will not be usable on Saturday and/or Sunday, limiting parking and shuttle opportunities. Unlike many other (more populated) cities in which large music festivals occur, Portland does not have an extensive public transit system. It is expected that attendees will make use of any on street parking they can find for up to two miles to the east, north and west of the park. Baxter Boulevard is unlikely to re-open to traffic before December 2023, further restricting access and egress. Management of traffic as attendees arrive and especially as they depart will become paramount. While C3's application acknowledges that parking and traffic management will be a challenge, their request for the use of City police and traffic personnel is likely unrealistic given that those departments are significantly understaffed.
